

Collaborating Within the Library: Bringing History and Impact to the Forefront

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Introduction

In library literature, one can often encounter examples of collaborations, particularly with partners outside of the library. Collaboration is a common element of organizational life and can prove to be useful as new services evolve or there is a desire to promote existing resources or services. Groups of library colleagues can come together in various ways on short term projects with results that can include articles and postings in various institutional news formats and websites, physical displays, presentations, and events. Projects at the Galter Library have brought together librarians from different library departments, service cores, and working groups, and provided them with opportunities to collaborate, utilizing their interests, skills, and expertise. The resulting projects accomplished through such collaborations involved various visualizations, displays, and presentations highlighting the impact of publications and library services over time.

NASIG Presentation and Publication




Collaborators: Metrics and Impact Core, Digital Systems and Collection Services, External PhD Researcher

Collaborators: Clinical Informationist Services, Metrics and Impact Core



Herman L. Kretschmer Display and Open House




Collaborators: SCWG members (representing: Metrics and Impact Core, Research and Information Services, Digital Systems and Collection Services)

Dissemination, Impact, and Access Workshop




Collaborators: Digital Systems and Collection Services, Metrics and Impact Core, Digital Initiatives Working Group

Conclusion: Elements of Success

These projects revealed several elements essential for success, which should be considered in any collaborative effort:

- Make and regularly update a timeline, with realistic deadlines for project components
- Regularly meet in person to resolve any confusion or conflicts
- Designate tasks for each person
- Ensure the balancing of time available and the tasks to be accomplished
- Vet and review progress at designated milestones
- Keep moving to reach desired goal
- Evaluate after completion
- Reuse and repurpose elements of the project, if appropriate
