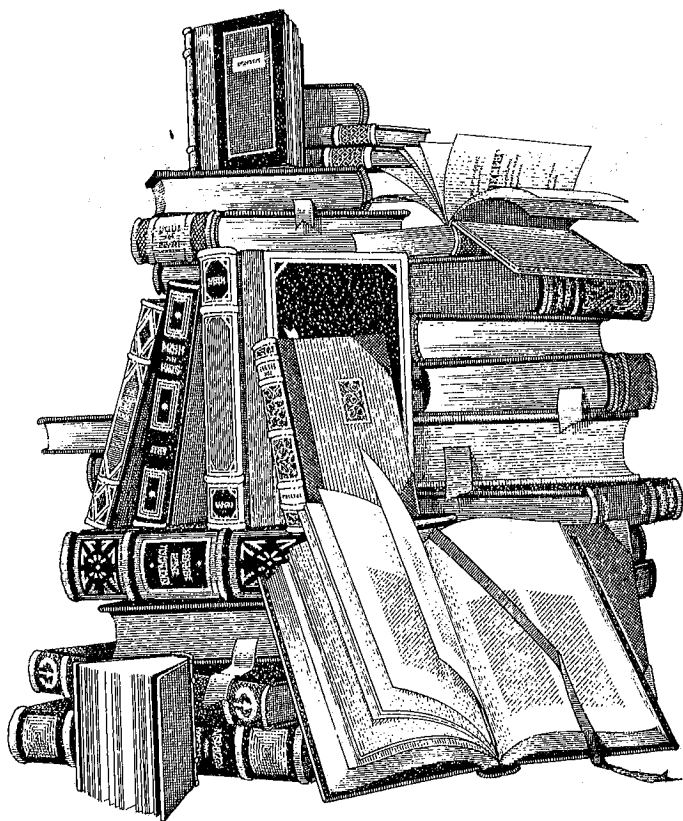

## NEW STATEWIDE CLEARINGHOUSE

The Illinois Public Health Association is in the process of establishing the Birth-to-Three Clearinghouse, a statewide information center dedicated to the collection and dissemination of information related to the 0-3 population, particularly developmentally disabled and high-risk infants. Primarily funded by a grant from the Governor's Planning Council on Developmental Disabilities (GPCDD), the clearinghouse will be located in the Springfield office of that agency.

This clearinghouse is a response to the growing need for materials and up-to-date information in the 0-3 service provider area. Current estimates indicate that there may be more than 20,000 young children in Illinois with such disabling conditions as autism, Down's Syndrome, spina bifida, congenital anomalies, to name a few (there are more than 4,000 separate causes of handicapping conditions), that could use habilitation and rehabilitation services. According to State Board of Education estimates, fewer than one-third of the children requiring services are receiving them. Part of the reason for this poor rate is that state law does not mandate services for children under three years of age. The Illinois General Assembly has thus far resisted establishing such a mandate citing the lack of solid evidence regarding the efficacy of such services and, specifically, the costs and benefits of providing a comprehensive array of services to handicapped infants and children.

Despite the lack of a mandate, a growing service network has appeared in Illinois to address that needs of handicapped children and their families. There is also a larger effort to coordinate state agency programs with a federally-funded interagency task force established to develop a statewide plan for 0-3 services.

The clearinghouse comes at a critical time in Illinois. The development of a print and audio-visual media library is at the heart of this project, and we invite HSLI members not only to make use of the collection at a future date, but also to provide advice on the project. While the clearinghouse recognizes that HSLI members are quite adept at accessing medical information for their users, they may have less access to information on developmental, educational and social issues in this area. It is hoped that the clearinghouse will also be able to maintain an up-to-date list of human and organizational resources for referral purposes.

The clearinghouse has recently joined HSLI, represented by project director, Chet Brandt, who came to the project from Brookens Library at Sangamon State University. # PRESIDENT'S LETTER



May 28, 1986

Dear HSLI Members:

The Spring HSLI Meeting in Champaign-Urbana was a rousing success. The program content was very worthwhile and the sixty people who attended found it enlightening.

Helene Steen, Treasurer, put together an important report which indicated that the Newsletter is costing the organization slightly more than is collected in dues. Some income is also received from our meetings so this is not as bad as it sounds. However, the board decided that the Newsletter expenses must be cut. Therefore, complete minutes of the meetings will not be attached as part of the Newsletter; instead, the President's letter will summarize the events of both the board and business meetings.

Bylaws changes were discussed and a ballot will be mailed to all personal members. Most changes are of a "housekeeping" nature; the matters of substance, if passed, would include the following:

1. The Program Committee is to be eliminated and the President-Elect will assume responsibility for coordination between the local organizing committee and the board. This model was used for the Champaign meeting and worked very well.
2. The name of the Nominating Committee will be changed to the Nominating and Elections Committee to more accurately reflect what they do.
3. If vacancies occur, replacements will be appointed for the remainder of the term. This will make the job of the Nominating and Elections Committee much easier and keep the natural "rotation" of officers in place.
4. The Nominating and Elections Committee will be mandated to nominate only one person for each office.
5. Twenty-five percent of the organization must be present to constitute a quorum. Previously, a majority of members registered for the meeting constituted a quorum; this meant that if thirty persons attended, fifteen members could make binding decisions for HSLI.
6. In addition to housekeeping items, one change is being proposed concerning the makeup of the Illinois State Council. NLM is requesting that a health professional be added to the Council.

The Membership Committee is cleaning up our membership records. As announced in the last Newsletter, persons who have not paid current dues will be dropped from the mailing list. This will also save mailing expenses. The membership survey is completed and being tabulated, results will be in a future Newsletter.

A summary of options and a discussion of a replacement Union List of Serials for Illinois was held. Because the costs for entering and storing data in the SILO list are so small, most health science libraries in the state are deciding to enter their lists in SILO; it seems that there is nothing to lose by doing this. The HSLI Board asked me, and the Illinois State Council asked Nancy Stump, to write to SILO to encourage them to use their 1986-87 grant funds to support the entry of some of the larger health science collections in their data base.

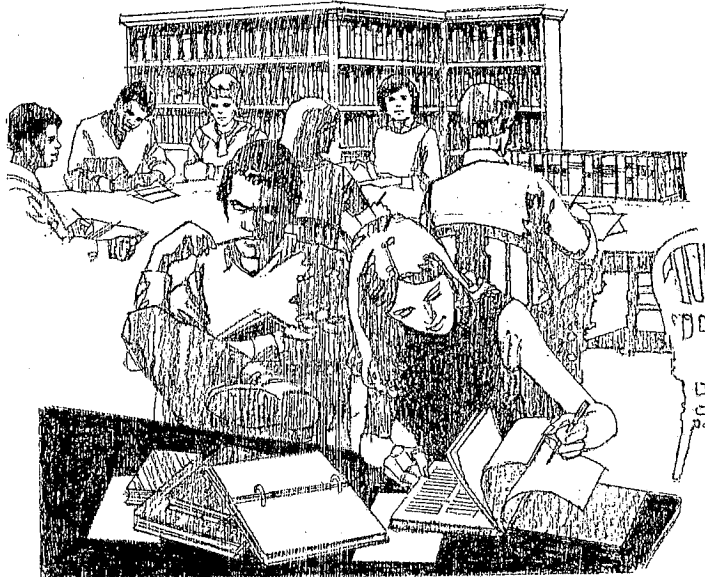

This year, GMRMLN has a limit of two (2) proposals which may be endorsed by each state council. The Illinois State Council has set up an Ad Hoc Committee to review the proposals in relation to the GMRMLN criteria.

The following procedure will be used for endorsement by the Illinois State Council:

2. All proposals must be postmarked by July 1, 1986. All proposals not postmarked by July 1, 1986 will be automatically rejected.
3. All proposals must be filled out completely by July 1, 1986. Those proposals not filled out completely will be rejected.
4. On a separate page please provide the following:
  1. What is the availability of materials on the topic within the state?
  2. What are your perceived needs for such material?

## GREATER MIDWEST REGIONAL MEDICAL LIBRARY NETWORK

### DISTRIBUTION OF THE 1986 NLM COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT FUNDS

National Library of Medicine Collection Development funds will be available for the 1986 fiscal year and will be distributed through the Greater Midwest Regional Medical Library Network (GMRMLN) Management Office. Applications for the allocation of these funds may be submitted by any Resource or Basic Unit Library in the ten-state region. A total of \$25,000 is to be distributed throughout the region. Applications for any amount between \$2500 and \$25,000 will receive consideration. Each proposal must be screened and endorsed by the appropriate State Council in an effort to eliminate any unnecessary duplication of materials and incomplete or inappropriate applications. Each State Council may submit two ranked proposals to the Collection Development Committee for consideration.

The funds are intended to be used for the acquisition of health related materials that will serve to enhance, extend, or expand an existing collection or to fill an identified need in the Region. Successful applications in 1985 covered the topics of: Physical and Psychological Effects of Nuclear War and Nuclear Radiation, Home Health Care, Medical Anthropology, Health Care Financing and Marketing, Geriatric Medicine Audiovisuals, Medical Devices and Equipment.

No restrictions will be placed on the type of materials purchased (print, microform, audiovisuals, etc) but the funds are NOT intended for the purchase of such things as shelving, office supplies, or equipment. If a new journal subscription is purchased with the funds, the library must be willing to pick up the subscription after the period of the grant. In submitting a proposal, each library will agree to prepare the necessary paperwork to enable the University of Illinois at Chicago to process the purchase requisition to order specified titles. In addition, each library will agree to catalog, house, and maintain the materials and to make them available to other libraries through Interlibrary Loan.

Criteria to be used by the Collection Development Committee in making awards will include:

1. the development of a subject area not yet adequately covered in the region (inadequacies in subject areas must be documented and verifiable; e.g., or survey methodology used in determining subject deficiency must be documented).
2. the ability of the library to provide housing, maintenance, and region-wide access to the materials.

Additional points that should be borne in mind:

1. The funds are NOT intended for the purchase of basic collections (e.g., the Brandon List). The National Library of Medicine Resource Improvement grants are a more suitable resource for financial aid in obtaining such basic materials.
2. Patient education materials will not be funded although material on the theory and practice of patient education would be suitable.
3. The application must include a complete list of materials to be purchased, including price, date of publication, and ISBN number, if known. Some changes in the final list may be necessary if items are found to be unavailable or if urgent need by the institution has required purchase before the awards are made.
4. Only those items requested in the application should be included. Copies of articles, letters from administrators, and publishers' are not suitable enclosures.
5. Only one application from each institution will be considered.

#### State Council Responsibilities:

State Councils should screen and evaluate each proposal with respect to the guidelines and criteria listed. A limit of two proposals from each state will be considered by the Collection Development Committee. Incomplete or inappropriate applications will be returned to the State Council. First ranked proposals will be reviewed first. Second proposals will be reviewed only if the total amount awarded to the State Councils' first ranked proposals does not equal \$25,000.

#### DEADLINE:

Proposals, together with approval and comments from the institution's respective State Council, must be submitted to the Management Office by August 1, 1986. Check with the State Council for its deadline.

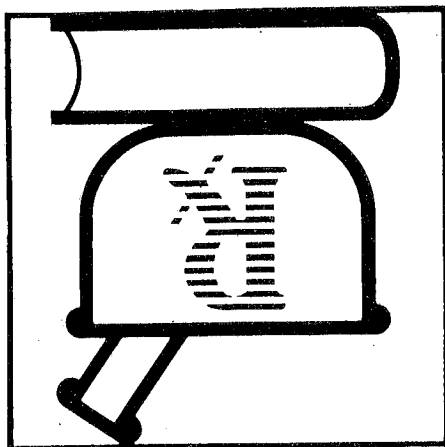
