Dear HSLI Members:



ILLINOIS STATE COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Two vacancies on the Illinois Council have been filled. Lutheran General Hospital, Joanne Crispen representative, has agreed to serve as a non-aligned representative on the Council until December 31, 1989. Suzanne Schriar was appointed the new Illinois State Library representative to the Illinois Council. She replaced Preston Levi who was appointed Acting Assistant Director of the Illinois State Library. The Council extends congratulations to Preston on his new position and welcomes its two new members.

Be sure to return the registry forms for the NLM/RML Directory if you have not done so as of yet. Illinois has had the largest percentage return of any Region III state, however it is still less than one third. Contact the GMRMLN Management Office for another form.

The Council asked the HSLI Board to investigate the possibility of producing an Illinois directory of institutional members of HSLI. The above registry forms or the current mailing list may be the basis for the directory.

Preston Levi noted that ILLINET negotiated a price of \$1,650 for the OMNIFAX G-77 telefaxsimile machine which includes a one year service fee. A box of paper costs \$72.00. Neither the Illinois State Library, HSLI, or the Illinois Council are recommending purchase of these products over any others.

Because of difficulties in appointing a health care professional to the Illinois Council during the last two years, the Council is recommending to the HSLI Bylaws Committee to delete all reference to the health care professional. The Council will continue to seek input from health care professionals.

Evaluation of HSLI Spring Meeting Program, 1988

The HSLI meeting was hosted by Sangamon State University on April 28 and 29, 1988. A half day workshop was presented on April 28, and a half day program on ILLINET/OCLC access on April 29. These were evaluated separately.

There were a total of 40 program participants who returned 21 program evaluation forms. Ten of the respondents were highly positive on all counts, eight were positive to highly positive, one was positive to some aspects but negative to others, and two responses were negative. Twelve responded with the following unique suggestions and comments (except for two who agreed on no. 9):

CE and/or program suggestions:

- 1. Consumer health information
- 2. Sources on information about alternative health care
- 3. LCS/ILLINET Online program
- 4. Computerizations (various: DOS, CPU mgmt, hard disk mgmt, software info., Local Area Network, "translation" problems from one program to another.
- 5. Personnel relations
- 6. Writing grant proposals
- 7. Marketing in house as well as to the outside
- 8. Patron satisfaction in times of budget constraints
- 9. No more OCLC or SILO ("I'v been saturated", "dull")

Program and speakers:

- 1. The communication skills of Paul Cappuzzell, OCLC's marketing Representative and keynote speaker, was rated excellent by two people.
- 2. One participant expected to hear a discussion of current legislative issues and was disappointed.
- 3. While handouts were useful, program was all talk.
- 4. While the Gov't Doc session attempted to address health issues, the legal session did not.

Mechanics of Meeting:

- 1. Larger name tags to help identify people across a table.
- 2. A tour of the University Library or the State Capital was suggested.
- 3. Lunch was rated super, and the host commended.
 The program was noted as well managed, ran smoothly, and on time.

The HSLI Workshop, April 28, 1988

Although two separate, concurrent workshops were planned, Health Sciences and Documents and Health Sciences and the Law, they were combined into one 3 hour session. The registrants were informed of this change just prior to the meeting. Twenty one out of a total of twenty four participants turned in their evaluations.

Since the evaluation forms did not permit separate evaluation of the two distinct topic presentations, the tally is for the combined workshop:

- 9 rated the workshop topics as highly relevant, 10 as relevant, 2 disagreed.
- 2. 20 rated the meeting as very well or well presented.
- 3. 6 rated information presented as very relevant, 12 as relevant, 2 disagreed (1 responded with a split opinion, rating one topic relevant the other not).
- 4. Handouts and demonstrations were rated as "very useful" by 12, "useful" by 6. There were 2 "disagree" and 1 no response.

Six people only made additional comments:

- 1. Workshop not relevant to hospital libraries.
- 2. I have a better idea what to do if this sort of question arises (did not specify legal or government documents).
- Presentation of legal material was "best I've ever heard".
- 4. This was a great session.
- Second presentation (legal) boring and not very relevant.
- 6. Too much information for time allotted -should have left it at two separate programs.

OCLC Membership Options -- Selective Use of the Interlibrary Loan Subsystem vs. Full OCLC Membership

Librarians who have considered the possibility of utilizing the OCLC database for their libraries have two options to choose from:

- 1) Participation in OCLC as a selective user of the Interlibrary Loan Subsystem.
- 2) Participation in OCLC as a full cataloging member.

Both selective users and full members have access to all 17.5 million bibliographic records in the OCLC database. Whereas full members have unlimited access to the holdings in OCLC, selective users are limited to the Group Access group members holdings only. To provide extended access for selective users, however, interlibrary loan requests can be referred outside the Group Access group when necessary to produce a fill.

Requirements for dial-access participation in OCLC as either a selective user or a full member include:

- 1) 1 computer terminal
- 2) modem
- 3) communications software package
- 4) selective users must participate in SILO

COSTS

Costs incurred for selective users of the Interlibrary Loan Subsystem include:
Dial-access authorization -- \$200.00 per year
Dial-access connect time -- 6.99 per hour
All online costs associated with use of the OCLC Interlibrary Loan Subsystem

Full members pay all of the above charges plus the following: Profiling -- approximately \$120.00 All costs associated with use of the Cataloging Subsystem, including all online activity, as well as catalog card production

AVERAGE COST OF INTERLIBRARY LOAN TRANSACTIONS ON OCLC

The average cost of one Interlibrary Loan transaction on OCLC is \$1.50 or \$.30 per location, since requests are routed to as many as five locations, if necessary to produce a fill. This cost includes all online charges associated with searching the database, completing an ILL workform, as well as the cost of dial-access connect time. A library

requesting 50 items per month, therefore, pays a monthly average of \$75.00 to route requests to as many as 250 locations.

AVERAGE COST OF CATALOGING ON OCLC

The average cost incurred for cataloging one book on OCLC is \$2.25. This cost includes card production for a set of catalog cards, as well as all online charges associated with searching the database, editing a record, and dial-access connect time. A library cataloging 3,000 books, therefore, pays roughly \$6,750.00 to catalog the collection in the OCLC database and produce cards. Costs incurred thereafter include cataloging and card production costs for new acquisitions. Essentially, if a library adds 500 volumes per year to their collection, the yearly cost to maintain their holdings in OCLC is \$1,125.00.

The Hospital Library Section of MLA has approved a "Certificate of Service" for retirees. The purpose of the Certificate of Service is to acknowledge and congratulate HLS members upon their retirement for their years of service in the field of hospital librarianship. - (1) have reached an acknowledged retirement age or tenure;

Alphabet Soup - Library Version

Have you seen a listing of organizations in Illinois and wondered what they do, who they represent, how they relate to you, your library or each other? This is an attempt to clarify the relationships of the following groups.

NLM - National Library of Medicine. GMRMLN - Greater Midwest Regional Medical Library Network.

RML/RL - Regional Medical Library or Resource Library HSLI - Health Science Librarians of Illinois. Illinois State Council or Illinois Council. Consortium (singular) or Consortia (plural). ILLINET.

NLM is part of the National Institutes of Health and collects health science literature for the scientific community. It has divided the country into seven regions. Region III is called GMRMLN and includes Illinois. The management office is at the RML or Regional Medical Library. Irwin Pizer is the RML Director and Ruby May is the Associate RML Director. The Management Office coordinates activities between the basic units, the RMLS, and the National Library of Medicine. Since resource sharing is important to the region, additional libraries have been designated Resource Libraries or RL's to help provide information and resources to the region.

GMRMLN has an advisory body called the Regional Council. It consists of the regional medical libraries and representatives from the ten states in Region III. Each state has one representative on the Regional Council. In Illinois HSLI offered to send a representative to the Regional Council. HSLI is an organization of individual librarians who meet twice a year to share concerns and participate in continuing education programs. HSLI revised its bylaws to include institutional members and established an Illinois Council to provide a representative to the Regional Council.

The Illinois Council consists of twelve members who represent consortia, non-aligned health science libraries, the resource libraries, and ILLINET. They meet three times a year and discuss issues of concern to the health science community. The Chair of the Illinois Council is the state's representative to the GMRMLN Regional Council.

Illinois has thirteen health science consortia or groups of libraries that gather together to discuss mutual concerns and share ideas and resources. Many health science libraries belong to a consortium. Most Resource Libraries do not belong to a consortium because they share resources throughout the Region. Health science libraries that do not belong to a consortium or are not a designated Resource Library are considered non-aligned for purposes of the Illinois Council.

ILLINET is the state network of libraries of all types. The Illinois State Library and the eighteen library systems form the core of ILLINET. Any health science library that belongs to a public or multitype library system is a member of ILLINET. The Illinois State Library has provided a representative to the Illinois Council ever since its founding in 1982.

This short? discussion of library alphabet soup could be twice as long. No mention has been made of the following organizations or groups: MLA, MC/MLA, SLA, ILA, and their subsets. Perhaps someone would like to enlighten HSLI members about these groups.


